

New Chairperson for HSFCFA

Governor Abercrombie has appointed Barbara Saromines-Ganne as the new Chairperson of the Hawai'i State Foundation on Culture and the Arts Commission effective July 20, 2011. Ms. Saromines-Ganne, who was sworn in as a commissioner on the same day, represents O'ahu Island and resides in Honolulu. She succeeds Mary Begier, whose engaging vision and leadership inspired HSFCFA commissioners and staff during a time of fiscal constraints.

“As an educator, I hope to bring my expertise in the arts and arts education to help promote learning and cultural access through programs like ArtBento that bring students to the Hawai'i State Art Museum, as well as through HSFCFA initiatives that reach out into communities across all islands such as Artists in the Schools, Artists in Residence, and many Biennium Grants-supported projects,” said Ms. Saromines-Ganne. As chair, she'll be a strong voice in support of arts education statewide.

“I sincerely believe in the arts as

being essential to every human being – regardless of the diversity of our backgrounds – and I hope to be highly visible in the art community as a Commissioner,” Ms. Saromines-Ganne continued. “I am also especially interested in programs that enhance and expand our unique Hawaiian cultural heritage.”

With over four decades as a professor of Art and Art History at Leeward Community College, Ms. Saromines-Ganne has been a staunch advocate for arts education in Hawai'i. She served six years as Chair of the Arts and Humanities Division. An early proponent of online education in the visual arts, Ms. Saromines-Ganne has also demonstrated the value of cultural heritage tourism through Great Museums, her popular summer study tours to Europe. She remains active as a guest lecturer in the fields of Asian and European art.

“Making sure that public funds are used responsibly and effectively is also key. The State Foundation must be creative in forming private/public partnerships to raise money and other support for the programs we sponsor,” commented Ms. Saromines-Ganne. “By staying in close contact with artists, educators, as well as businesses and entrepreneurs who are in a position to help nurture the arts, I hope to be an effective spokesperson with a clear commitment to serving HSFCFA in every capacity.”

Join us on August 5th for Live from the Lawn on First Fridays as the Hawai'i State Foundation on Culture and the Arts and the Friends of the Hawai'i State Art Museum present Aerial Romance, featuring the acrobatic artistry of Samadhi Hawaii. Suspended from the monkeypod trees on the front lawn, Samadhi's aerial dancers will perform high-flying choreography inspired by the stories of the Hawaiian islands.

Slack key master guitarist Jeff Peterson and his trio accompany the aerialists, joined by ukulele virtuoso Taimane Gardner and chanteuse Starr Kalahiki. Musical selections have been carefully coordinated with Samadhi to heighten the choreography's effect. This much-anticipated annual show-

case introduces Samadhi's talented young students who will be fresh from an intensive aerial acrobatics course. Also gracing the lawn stage is Na Palapalai member and Hilo native, Kuana Torres Kahele, who will be performing original songs from his just-released solo album Kaunaloa.

All galleries of the Hawaii State Art Museum are open to the public during the event as well as the Showcase Hawaii museum shop. 

Listen, observe, learn and enjoy some of the Ki ho’alu Slack Key guitar styles of Donald Kauli’a during your lunch break at the HiSAM. Watch an interactive demonstration of “the 10-minute technique” for learning to play and hear about the history and evolution of this island art form.

Donald Kauli’a is a 2010/2011 grant recipient of a HSFCA Teacher Apprenticeship through the Folk and Traditional Arts Program. He mentors 17 year old Kealekehe High School student Joseph Hing. [You can watch them online here.](#) A 2009 Grammy Nominee and recipient of a 2009 Na Hoku Hanohano Award for Slack Key Kings II, Donald has been teaching slack key since 1996. First teaching at his home on Maui, he now has a slack key academy on the Big Island at the Kona International Market and in Waimea at the Parker Ranch Mall. Every year he spends four months teaching Ki ho’alu to exchange students of Cornell University as part of their cultural learning curriculum.
