City Artwork of the Month

Sky Gate, Isamu Noguchi, 1992



Sky Gate was created by Isamu Noguchi (1904–1988), one of the twentieth century's most important and critically acclaimed sculptors. The sculpture was dedicated in April 20, 1977 and sits in the Civic Center lawn between Frank Fasi Municipal Building (FMB) and Honolulu Hale. Responding to the island's winds, skies, and mountains, Noguchi designed Sky Gate as a wide-open portal, to link the earth and the cosmos. The three legs rise up to a crown that change in shape as viewers move around the sculpture.

Noguchi was one of six finalists for the Municipal Building Project. After the FMB was dedicated in 1974, a design competition was held for a suspended ceiling sculpture in open air ground lobby. Once Noguchi was offered the commission he rejected the idea of an indoor lobby setting and chose the outdoor lawn area for Sky Gate where he envisioned the microcosmic gateway as a gathering space for the community.

While constructing *Sky Gate*, he was subjected to both praise and ridicule. Some called the design a "sewer project" and "potty seat for King Kong," while others described his work as stunning, interesting, and clean, and compared it to some of the great masterpieces of the world. For instance, Andrew Charles Yanoviak in Hawai'i Architect (1992) stated, "In ancient Egypt and classical Greece, such geometrical revolutions would be treasured in temples."

Every May and July, people gather at *Sky Gate* to observe *kau ka lā lolo i ka lolo* (the sun rests upon the brain), also known as Lāhainā Noon, a time of great mana when the sun and the *aka* (shadow) retreats into the body. Exhibiting Noguchi's mastery of geometrical design and environmental sensitivity, *Sky Gate*'s shadow projects a perfect ring.
