



State to Honor Daniel Inouye and Patsy Mink in Commissioned Sculptures

he Hawai'i State Foundation on Culture and the Arts has issued a call in Hawai'i and around the globe for artists to create commissioned works in honor of the late Senator Daniel K. Inouye and the late Representative Patsy T. Mink.

Earlier this year, the State Legislature passed Act 281 instructing HSFCA to commission the sculptures,

in memory of Inouye and Mink, to be located in the area near the State Capitol known as the Honolulu Civic Center. "These will be

two of the most anticipated and scrutinized pieces

of art ever commissioned by the State of Hawai'i, in line with the historic statues of King Kamehameha, Prince Kuhio, Father Damien, and Duke Kahanamoku," said Barbara Saromines-Ganne, chair of HSFCA's Board of Commissioners. "This process will lead to works of art honoring the late Senator Inouye and Representative Mink that will embody their dedication, deep devotion, and unmatched contributions to the well-being of the people of Hawai'i."

The State Legislature instructed that \$250,000 from the Works of Art special fund be expended for each work. The fund comes from one-percent of the cost of capital improvement projects undertaken by the state. Hawai'i was the first state in the nation to have such a law, and remains a national leader for art in public places.

The Legislature specified that the committee for the selection of the art honoring the two long-time Hawai'i leaders will consist of representatives chosen by the Governor, the Senate

and appropriate works of art to honor Inouye and Mink.

Through this Request for Qualifications the SFCA intends to establish a qualified pool of professional artists for consideration. Semi-finalists selected may be asked to develop detailed proposals for the monuments.

Visual artists must apply via Café (<u>www.callforentry.org</u>), a website developed by the Western States Arts Federation to facilitate calls for artists. The Café registration is free, secure and offers access to visual arts opportunities nationwide.

The deadline for applications is August 26, 2013.



On August 25, 2013 at Orvis Auditorium, the musicians, dancers/actors and singers of the Wo Lok Music Club celebrate their 42nd anniversary and recent Cantonese Opera Apprenticeships from the Hawai'i State Foundation on Culture and the Arts as part of HSFCA's Living Heritage Series Outreach.

Founded to perpetuate and promote the art form of Cantonese opera, the club includes approximately 30 musicians, actors and singers. This will be their first full concert since 1998.

Hawai'i has had an active Cantonese opera community based in Honolulu for over 100 years. From 1993 through 2011, twenty-one Cantonese opera projects were successfully completed under the HSFCA's Folk & Traditional Arts Apprenticeship Grants Program, with projects affiliated with any one of three clubs in existence at the time. There are currently two active clubs – Wo Lok Music Club and the Ching Wan Music & Drama Society.

The HSFCA apprenticeships allow the teacher to focus a minimum of 80 hours in one-on-one instruction with his or her apprentice on an aspect of Cantonese opera music, singing or acting. With each successive project, the reservoir of knowledge and skill has deepened.

For over a year, members of the Wo Lok Music Club have been refining the pieces that they will perform on August 25th. A number of sifus, who specialize in different instruments and singing parts, lead the weekly practices. Members have used audio recordings of their practice sessions as tools for self-improvement and have dedicated countless hours outside of rehearsals to practice as duet pairs.

This Cantonese Opera performance is a production of the Wo Lok Music Club, and is supported in part by the Hawai'i State Foundation on Culture and the Arts (through appropriations from the Legislature of the State of Hawai'i and the National Endowment for the Arts), the National Organization for Traditional Artists Exchange, and the University of Hawai'i at Manoa Outreach College, as well as private donations.

Summer Institutes – Full STEAM Ahead: Teachers Learn About the Arts by Doing

hat do ice balloons, volcanoes, writing without pencils, and clapping, snapping and tapping have in common? All were part of 2012-2013 professional development workshops on arts integration offered to Hawaii's classroom teachers with funding support from HSFCA, through appropriations from the state legislature and the National Endowment for the Arts.

Two courses for classroom teachers — "Summer Insti-

at MACC as presenter Marcia Daft from the Kennedy Center helped 63 teachers — pre-K through Grade 6 — use rhythm, movement and creativity to teach math concepts such as 'repeating pattern.' The institute was held at the MACC on June 5-7 for lower elementary teachers and June 12-14 for upper elementary. Marcia Daft will return to Maui in the fall to work with teachers as they implement strategies from the summer institute.

Aiea Elementary hosted 80 teachers from around the state for the ARTS FIRST Institute from June 11-14. Educators devoted the mornings to understanding the similarities in processes between science and the arts. Jamie Simpson Steele and Lori Fulton from the University of Hawaii College of Education led these hands-on sessions. During the afternoons, teachers learned how specific art forms integrate with science; participants studied Visual Art, Music, Dance or Drama with presenters Marcia Pasqua, Michael Wall, Mauli Ola Cook or Daniel A. Kelin II, respectively — all highly qualified teaching artists on HSFCA's Artistic Teaching Partners Roster.

In addition, the 2013-2014 Collaborative Residency (CR) Project was kicked off at the Institute. Seven teaching artists paired with twelve teachers will be co-designing and co-teaching residencies this fall. Both the ARTS FIRST Institute and the CR Project are collaborations involving Honolulu Theatre for Youth (HTY), Hawaii Arts Alliance, Hawaii Department of Education (DOE) and the State Foundation.

Earlier this year, the State Foundation helped to fund HTY's course, "Before Pencil Touches Paper: Creativity-based

Strategies to get K-6 Struggling Students Ready to Write." Presented over three Saturdays in the spring, the classes were led by drama specialist Daniel A. Kelin II and writer Paul Wood. Kelin and Wood also taught demonstration classes in each of the participating teachers' classrooms to provide additional coaching as to how to incorporate specific strategies into class lessons.
