



# POETRY OUT LOUD: Hawai'i High School Students To Compete in National Recitation Contest

Poetry Out Loud is a national recitation contest that encourages high school students to learn about great poetry through performance and competition for \$50,000 in cash and school stipends. This is the seventh year that the Hawai'i State Foundation on Culture and the Arts and Honolulu Theatre for Youth have

partnered to bring Poetry Out Loud to students here in Hawai'i.

Public and private high schools in Hawai'i are invited to hold

classroom and schoolwide contests during the fall semester, with each individual school's winner advancing to a state competition on March 18, 2012, in Honolulu. The Hawai'i state champion wins \$200 and an all-expenses-paid trip to Washington D.C. to compete at the National Finals for the \$20,000 grand prize. Participating schools receive free, standards-based curriculum materials for use including print anthologies and an audio CD featuring well-known actors and writers such as James Earl Jones, Anthony Hopkins, and Rita Dove.

Lea Di Marchi from Punahou School was selected as the 2011 Hawai'i Poetry Out Loud champion and represented the state in the 2011 National Finals. More than 365,000 students from 2,255 high schools took part in the 2010–2011 Poetry Out Loud program.

"To memorize a great poem is to make a friend of it for life," said John Barr, President of the Poetry Foundation. "Poetry Out Loud brings new energy to an ancient art by returning it to the classrooms of America."

Poetry Out Loud seeks to foster the next generation of literary readers



by capitalizing on the latest trends in poetry - recitation and performance. Selecting a piece out of an anthology of 650 contemporary and

classical poems, students learn about their literary heritage while also mastering public speaking skills. The program builds on the resurgence of poetry as an oral art form, as seen in the slam poetry movement and the immense popularity of hip hop music among youth.

"Poetry Out Loud's growth demonstrates the program's importance as a forum for Hawaii's youth to explore their creative voices through the performing and literary arts," said Ronald Yamakawa, HSFCA Executive Director.

## Art Lunch Lecture: Tamagusuku Ryu Senjukai Frances Nakachi Ryubu Dojo Presents Okinawan Dance, Sharing Our Heartfelt Artistry Tuesday, December 27, 2011, 12 Noon – 1 p.m., Free

The HSFCA Folk and Traditional Arts Master Teacher Frances Nakachi and her apprentice Mina Tamashiro of Tamagusuku Ryu Senjukai Hawai'i will share the music and dance of Okinawa.

Tamagusuku Ryu Senjukai Frances Nakachi Ryubu Dojo was established fifteen years ago in Hawai'i by Frances Nakachi Sensei. She holds the highest level of teaching certification in Okinawan dance. She studied under the acclaimed grand dance masters Yoshiko Tanita Sensei and Mieko Kinjo Sensei in Okinawa who have been certified as National Intangible Cultural Assets by the Japanese government.

Frances and her students take great

pride in perpetuating the Okinawan culture in Hawai'i and sharing their passion in Okinawan dancing. Senjukai Hawaii offers children's classes for students from 3 to 12 year-olds and adult classes for students of all ages.
