Museum without Walls Program Adds Art to Hilo Judiciary Complex

ay was a busy month for the Art in Public Places team. Following the installation of two commissioned works by Sean K. Lee Loy Browne and Nicholas Bleecker at the Hilo Judiciary Complex, the Hawai'i State Foundation on Culture and the Arts installed 16 works of art on three floors of the new Judiciary.

The Art in Public Places Program acquires works of art for its collection to enhance and humanize the environment of Hawai'i's state buildings, and to provide aesthetic and educational experiences for staff and the visiting general public.

Within the Art in Public Places Program is the Relocatable Works of Art Program which places works of art from the Art in Public Places Collection in areas accessible to the public within state buildings as part of the Museum without Walls Program. These new art installations in Hilo are now part of this innovative outreach program.

The artists whose works are in the Hilo Judiciary Complex include Les Biller, Kenneth Bushnell, Pat Swenson Ebert, Levina Gerritsen, Margaret George, Pamela Hayes, Terry Lee Hobbs, John Kjargaard, Ronald Koehler, Marcia Morse, Timothy P. Ojile, Alice Kagawa Parrott, and Franco Salmoiraghi.

While in Hilo, the Exhibition Specialists also serviced over 20 sites including Hilo High School, Queen Kapiolani Elementary School, Waiakea Elementary School, Kaumana Elementary School, Department of Agriculture, District Health Office, DLNR Land Management Office, Governor's Liaison Office, DLIR District Office, UH Hale Akea Center, UH Hilo Chancellor's Office, and UH Hilo Human Resources Department.

Cheryl Yoshie Nakasone – Okinawan Dance

Celebrating the 25th Year of the HSFCA Folk Arts Apprenticeship Program Tuesday, July 28, 2009, 12-1 p.m., Hawai'i State Art Museum; Free

oin us for our Art Lunch lecture entitled Cheryl Yoshie Nakasone – Okinawan Dance to be held at the Hawai'i State Art Museum in the Multipurpose Room on Tuesday, July 28th at noon.

This special presentation is part of the 25th anniversary celebration of the HSFCA Folk Arts Apprenticeship Program. The public is invited to the free event.

Born into a family of prominent Okinawan musicians, Cheryl Yoshie Nakasone started dancing when she was two years old. Unable to find instructors to take her earlier, her parents sent her for formal instruction from the age of seven. In 1972, Nakasone began instruction under celebrated dance master Ryōshō Kin in Okinawa. Under Kinsensei, she became the first foreignborn dancer to complete all levels of the rigorous Ryūkyū Shimpo Geinō Konkūru examinations and, in 1977, was awarded the title of shihan. In the same year, Nakasone was designated the United States head of the Jimpu Kai Kin Ryōshō Dance Academy.

As an artist and instructor, Nakasone has reached into communities in both Hawai'i and California. Not only has she taught dance classes for Okinawan clubs in northern California, but she has also served as a lecturer at the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA), and the University of Hawaiʻi at the Hilo and Mānoa campuses. She is currently a lecturer at the UH-Mānoa Department of Theatre and Dance. In addition to teaching at her studio in Honolulu, Nakasone also teaches on Maui and oversees an affiliate branch on the island of Hawaiʻi.

Through the HSFCA Folk Arts Apprenticeship Program, Nakasone has passed on her legacy as a master of Okinawan dance to her apprentices Yukie Shiroma, Earl Ikeda, Lynde Takemi Tomori, and Charlene Gima, who is her current apprentice. Nakasone's lecture will focus on the dances and Kumi Udui, or classical dance drama, of Okinawa.
