

Maui Arts & Cultural Center's CanDo! Days for Students

The Maui Arts & Cultural Center (MACC) is committed to community enrichment through the arts and arts education. Like the Hawai'i State Foundation on Culture and the Arts, MACC is an ARTS FIRST Partner supporting statewide arts education.

Teachers and students have said that the most popular field trip in Maui County is the MACC's CanDo! Days. Every year, over 6,000 students in grades 1 to 5 spend a day in MACC's studios participating in dance, drama and visual arts lessons taught by professional teaching artists. The lessons are standards based and thematic.

This year, the focus is on the environment: the ocean and its rich bounty for grades 1 and 2; Hawai'i's pristine rain forests for grades 3 and 4, and the power of volcanoes for grade 5. Students act out stories, choreograph their own dances, and create beautiful works of art to take home and share with their families.

Even kids in faraway Hana on Maui and on the islands of Moloka'i and Lana'i have the opportunity for this creative and inspiring arts experience. MACC provides the means for teaching artists to travel to these locations every year. Students are learning to communicate, collaborate, create, and problem-solve—skills necessary for success in the 21st century.

A Maui teacher recently noted, "With the switch to Common Core State Standards nationwide, which means performance based assessment, kids need more opportunities and direction in performance based subjects like the arts. CanDo! Day provides this."

Nearly twelve years of research at three public schools on Maui has shown the impact of arts integration on student learning and teacher effectiveness. Student engagement, motivation to learn, and ability to remember con-

cepts, vocabulary, and details are greatly improved when the arts are integrated in other subject areas. The teachers who take arts professional development workshops every year, partner with teaching artists in the classroom. They reflect on their learning in groups and are very effective and motivated to perform

at the highest level. MACC has seen test scores improve in the classrooms of these extremely effective teachers.

In 1995, MACC and the Department of Education-Maui District joined the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts program, "Partners in Education." As one of 104 partnerships between performing arts centers and school districts in 45 states, the joint MACC and Maui DOE team is one of the strongest in the country, committed to providing professional development

Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam, Hawai'i, is home to the U.S. Air Force Band of the Pacific – Hawaii. Historically, the 35-piece unit performed for base and community functions from 1947 to 1975. During the draw down following the Vietnam War, the band was deactivated. With the establishment of the Headquarters of the Pacific Air Forces, the 17-piece United States Air Force Band of the Pacific – Hawai'i was created.

Chief Master Sergeant Laura C. Noel, a vocalist, leads this well-respected band and oversees the 17 band members as they travel and perform throughout the Pacific region.



ATP Roster Applications Open

The HSFCA Arts Education Program is seeking experienced teaching artists for its Artistic Teaching Partners (ATP) Roster. The ATP Roster is an adjudicated directory of Hawaii professional teaching artists qualified to conduct in-depth residencies in educational settings. Schools applying for an Artists in the Schools (AITS) grant are required to use a teaching artist from this roster. Accomplished artists and non-profit arts organizations that exemplify artistic excellence in dance, music, drama, literary arts, or visual arts, as well as excellence in the engagement of students in the creative process are eligible to apply. Applicants must be State of Hawaii residents with a minimum of three years of experience

teaching arts in a classroom setting.

Application guidelines, instructions and forms will be on the [HSFCA website](#) after May 5. Step 1 in the application process is to submit the Letter of Intent (use form on website) and a current resume by June 28, 2013 to HSFCA. A panel will review all of the letters of intent and resumes. A limited number of applicants will then be invited to submit their full application and to continue on with Steps 2-4 of the process. Successful applicants would be eligible to teach in the 2014-2015 school year.


University of Hawai‘i at Manoa and now shares his knowledge of culture and craft by instructing students in the ancient arts of sled building and surfboard carving.

Informing & Inspiring: The 2013 Teaching Artist Institute

Sixty-five teaching artists and arts administrators from Oahu, Hawaii, Maui, Kauai and Molokai, gathered on March 21-22 for the 2013 Teaching Artists Institute: “Inspiring Our Work: Best Practices.” On the beautiful grounds of Hanahau`oli School, these arts educators listened to speakers, participated in workshops, collaborated on arts performances, and shared ideas in small groups, all with the purpose of reflecting on their teaching practice.

The featured speaker was Nick Jaffe, musician, curriculum writer, and Chief Editor of The Teaching Artist Journal from Chicago. He reminded us all about the primacy of students making art that they care about—the many things they will learn from doing so are a result or by-product of making real art.

Jamie Simpson Steele, Assistant Professor of Performing Arts in the College of Education at the University of Hawaii, gave a presentation on the new Common Core Standards in language arts and math that have been adopted by most states, and how they can be integrated with the arts.

“It was really illuminating how the content standards could really open possibilities in teaching as opposed to limit them.”

There was also time for teaching artists to gather with others in their specific art form to exchange ideas on everything from classroom management, to communicating with teachers, to favorite tricks of the trade.

A smaller group of teaching artists who lead workshops or courses for classroom teachers stayed for a third day to hone their presentation and facilitation skills.

Teaching artists on HSFCA’s Artistic Teaching Partners Roster are eligible to conduct residencies in the Artists in the Schools Program. They take annual professional development workshops to help keep them up to date on research and trends in arts education. This was the first time that a 2-day institute was offered. It was co-planned by Honolulu Theatre for Youth (HTY), the Hawaii Arts Alliance and HSFCA. Funding was provided by HTY through a grant from the Hawaii Community Foundation, and by HSFCA through appropriations from the Hawaii State Legislature and the National Endowment for the Arts. Based on the positive feedback received, planning for next year’s institute has already begun!

In Their Own Words: Keiki Share About Artists in the Schools

As the 2012-2013 Artists in the Schools (AITS) residencies wrap up, HSFCFA is receiving final reports and evaluations from each school. The overwhelming sentiment is that these residencies in visual arts, music, dance, literary arts or drama are a sorely needed and very welcome addition to student learning. "It was an excellent residency." "The students always look forward to the sessions." "Students were challenged to use creativity and imagination." "I noticed

that my entire class began working together better." "Several of my students who struggle with academics in a traditional school setting really came to life and were leaders during drama."

And on and on. But the most touching thoughts come, unsolicited, from the children themselves. These two students from Waimalu Elementary had an AITS drama residency with Honolulu Theatre for Youth. They wrote thank you letters to their legislators for funding the program.




'Ulu'ulu: The Henry Ku'ualoha Giugni Moving Image Archive of Hawai'i Tuesday, June 4, 2013 10 a.m. – 12 p.m.

'Ulu'ulu: The Henry Ku'ualoha Giugni Moving Image Archive of Hawai'i was created to perpetuate and share the rich moving image heritage of Hawai'i through the preservation of film and videotape related to the history and culture of Native Hawaiians and the people of Hawai'i. A special project under the Academy for Creative Media in the University of Hawai'i System, the archive is located in the library on the new Kapolei campus of the University of Hawai'i, West O'ahu.

At this community workshop, head archivist Janel Quirante, outreach consultant Heather Giugni and project director Chris Lee share about the 'Ulu'ulu program and how it can assist our Hawai'i artists, artist groups, and arts & cultural organizations that have documented and recorded artistic and cultural activities over the decades. A variety of media materials now exist, some properly "archived" and some not, but all potentially at risk. Learn about basic care and preservation challenges in Hawaii for audiovisual mate-

rial as well as resources for digitization. 'Ulu'ulu is a Hawaiian word meaning collections, assembly, or gathering. The archive is not just a collection of moving image items, but also an assembly of voices, communities, and stories; a gathering place for people to share Hawai'i's culture, traditions and collective memory.
