



# Bronze Sculpture by Satoru Abe at Maui Community College

Renowned artist Satoru Abe recently completed a bronze sculpture entitled *A Path through the Trees*, which was installed at Maui Community College on September 24, 2009. The work was commissioned by the Art in Public Places Program of the Hawai'i State Foundation on Culture and the Arts.

According to Abe, this work represents a group of five trees surrounding an abstract geographical representation of the island of Maui, with a pair of islands that represent the island's two dominating peaks, Haleakala and the West Maui Mountains. It serves both as a gathering place and a symbol of Maui. As one passes through, one is reminded of the metaphor that Maui Community College plays in both the Maui community and in the students' journey.

The artist says that this is his last commissioned work of art, and it is probably the largest sculpture he has ever produced. Each of the five trees reaches up to 12 feet in height, so it's not surprising that the sculpture can be seen from many locations on the campus.

Abe was born in Honolulu, Hawai'i in 1926. He studied at the California School of Fine Arts and the Art Students League of New York. His works are in many collections including The Contemporary Museum (Honolulu), the Honolulu Academy of Arts, and the Hawai'i State Art Museum.

## Arts in Crisis Seminars on O'ahu and Maui

Representatives of local arts organizations, as well as legislators, educators, and the general public, are encouraged to attend a free presentation entitled *Arts in Crisis: A Kennedy Center Initiative 50 State Tour.* The seminars are to be held on O'ahu and Maui on December 16th and 17th.

The seminars feature Michael M. Kaiser, President of the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, D.C. Kaiser has been president of the Kennedy Center since January 2001. He has expanded the educational and artistic programming for our nation's center for the performing arts, and is considered a national authority in arts management and administration.

Kaiser is an advisor to performing arts organizations around the world on building institution strength through marketing, strategic planning, and fundraising, and in this capacity, is working with arts leaders in 60 countries.

In February 2009, he created *Arts in Crisis: A Kennedy Center Initiative*, a program to provide free arts management consulting to non-profit performing arts organizations around the United States.

The program provides free and confidential planning assistance in areas that are of critical importance to sustaining a performing arts organization in a troubled economy. For more information on the seminar, visit <u>www.artsincrisis.org</u>.

## **U.S./Japan Creative Artists' Program**

rtists may apply for the U.S./ Japan Creative Artists' Program, which is sponsored by the Japan-U.S. Friendship Commission in cooperation with the National Endowment for the Arts.

The program provides support for up to five outstanding contemporary and traditional artists from the U.S. to spend a five-month residency in Japan to pursue their individual artistic goals. The application deadline is Monday, February 1, 2010. Eligible applicants are architects, choreographers, composers, creative writers, designers, media artists, playwrights, visual artists, or solo theater artists who work with original material (including puppeteers, storytellers, and performance artists). Multidisciplinary artists and artistic directors of theater or dance companies are also eligible.

The program is extremely competitive. Applicants should have regional or national recognition and anticipate a highly rigorous review of their work. Artists should also present compelling reasons for wanting to work in Japan. Selected artists will receive: a monthly stipend for living expenses and a housing supplement, as well as an allowance for professional support services, up to \$6,000 for round trip transportation for the artist, domestic partner, and/ or dependent children, and a baggage/ storage allowance; and a stipend for pre-departure Japanese language study in the U.S. For more information, guidelines, and application, go to www.jusfc.gov/creativeartists.asp.



Percussionist Sango from Nigeria, Africa will astound you with an amazing performance featuring the music and rhythms of his homeland.



The Art Lunch lecture entitled Nau Ka Wae: The Choice Belongs to You will be held at the Hawai'i State Art Museum in the Multipurpose Room on Tuesday, November 24th at noon. Ka'ili Chun will speak about her work. This event is part of the HSFCA Awards Recipient Series and the 25th Anniversary of the HSFCA Folk Arts Apprenticeship Program.


The artist's principal media is largescale conceptual installations, which increasingly involve issues related to indigenous and Native Hawaiian affairs. She has been mentored and influenced by two important artists, Toshiko Takaezu of Princeton University, and Wright Bowman, Sr., a Native Hawaiian master canoe builder and wood worker. She says she views her apprenticeship with Wright Bowman as a rare and privileged opportunity.

Chun has participated in oneperson, juried, and group exhibitions in Washington, Alaska, Hawai'i, New York, and Germany. She has received several awards including an Individual Artist Visual Arts Fellowship in Conceptual Art (2000) and Folk Arts Apprenticeship Awards (1999, 2000, and 2001) from the Hawai'i State Foundation on Culture and the Arts.

She was also the recipient of the Alfred Preis Memorial Award (1998) from the Honolulu Academy of Arts. In 2003, Chun was included in The Contemporary Museum's Sixth Biennial of Hawai'i Artists, notable due to the fact that it was only the second time in the museum's history that an indigenous Hawaiian has been invited to exhibit there.

Chun was awarded the prestigious Catherine E.B. Cox Award for Excellence in the Visual Arts (2006) from the Honolulu Academy of Arts, which culminated in the solo exhibition, *Nau Ka Wae, The Choice Belongs to You.* Her work is included in private and institutional collections in Hawai'i and Germany.

Chun was born and raised in Honolulu. She is a graduate of the Kamehameha Schools and has a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in Architecture from Princeton University and a Master of Fine Arts degree from the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa. She currently serves as a lecturer at Kapi'olani Community College.
