## Live From The Lawn: Honoring Our National Heritage Fellows

n the *second* Friday in September, Live from the Lawn features Eddie Kamae and Ledward Kaapana in an extraordinary showcase, "Honoring Our National Heritage Fellows." The concert is presented in conjunction with two exhibition openings at the HiSAM. Kumu Kamaki Kanahele conducts the opening 'oli and Senator Brickwood Galuteria will guest emcee.

The National Heritage Fellowship Award from the National Endowment for the Arts is the highest award bestowed to tra-

ditional and folk artists. 16 Hawai'i artists and musicians have received this lifetime honor. This unforgettable concert features the 2011 recipient, Ledward Kaapana, and the 2007 recipient, Eddie Kamae, along with Mike Kaawa and the Sons of Hawaii.

# HSFCA receives 54 works of art from The Contemporary Museum

n Friday August 26th, Governor Neil Abercrombie accepted, on behalf of the people of Hawai'i, a gift of 54 works by Hawai'i artists from The Contemporary Museum (TCM) to the Hawai'i State Foundation on Culture and the Arts at a ceremony at Washington Place.

"This very generous gift will enable more of Hawai'i's people to see and enjoy these wonderful examples of Hawai'i's artistic excellence,' said Governor Abercrombie.

"The board of The Contemporary Museum prefers that these works be in public places where more people can view them,' said Vi Loo, vice chair of the Honolulu Academy of Arts board and former TCM board president. "We feel that the State Foundation, with its substantial collection, many state buildings and offices in which to place art, as well as the Hawai'i State Art Museum, offers an ideal situation that meets

the goals of TCM and the original donors of the works."

The unconditional gift results from the merger of The Contemporary Museum and the Honolulu Academy of Arts. The gift was approved by the board of The Contemporary Museum with concurrence of the Honolulu Academy of Arts and accepted by a vote of the commissioners of State Foundation on Culture and the Arts.

"This valuable donation is most welcome. It is another example of the respect the artistic community in Hawai'i has for the State Foundation that they are willing to entrust these works of art to our care," said Barbara Saromines-Ganne, chair of the SFCA Commission.

Of the 5,600 relocatable works of art in the SFCA collection, an unprecedented 66 percent are on view in public buildings and space.

She will discuss how human and natural geographies, topographical mapping, and conservation in the Waikamoi Forest Preserve on Maui have all influenced her new work. A teacher and an artist, Abigail sees contemporary art as a way to perpetuate a living Hawaiian identity and culture in the present day. Abigail Romanchak (www.abigailromanchak.com) received a BFA and MFA in printmaking from the University of Hawai'i, Manoa. She has held teaching positions at Punahou School, Honolulu Academy of Arts, Hui No'eau Visual Arts Center, and Maui Arts and Cultural Center. In 2007 Abigail returned home to Maui to assist master printmaker Paul Mullowney at the Hui Press in Makawao. Widely exhibited in the United States and internationally, her work has also been acquired by institutions such as Australia National Museum, Hanapi Foundation, and the Hawai'i State Foundation on Culture and the Arts. Most recently, Abigail received the Ellen Craig Choy Award for most outstanding artist in The Contemporary Museum's Biennial IX.
