he Pacific Fleet Rock Band debuts at the historic No. 1 Capitol Building with audience favorites for September's First Friday celebrations. The band is comprised of 10 superb musicians who combine their talents to entertain audiences around the islands and around the world while representing the United States Pacific Fleet. Friday's set list includes songs from Israel "IZ" Kamakawiwo'ole, Jason Mraz, Van Morrison, Eddie Floyd and even Lady Gaga.

Fittingly, the Hawai'i State Art Museum is the site of the former Armed Services YMCA. "To have our Navy's Pacific Fleet Band perform in a historic building that was once home to our military during the Pacific War makes this First Friday concert even more significant," said Eva Laird Smith, executive director of the Hawaii State Foundation on Culture and the Arts.

"We are indeed excited about this incredible venue," said band member MU1 Joseph Muzika. Based at the Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam here on Oahu, the Fleet performs around the Pacific, including at the recent Pacific Friendship gathering in Indonesia.

This presentation will feature demonstrations of techniques using different colored feathers, (both dyed and natural) from various types of bird (such as goose, pheasant, duck and peacock). Boris will take you on a journey of Hawaiian feather art from the past through the present. His intent is to use his feather lei making skills to contribute to raising awareness of Hawaiian feather art, as well as to promote the status of the lei within and beyond its cultural background, and forward into the future.

Boris' lei hulu have appeared in fundraising events for organizations such as the Hawaii Theatre Center, Manoa Valley Theatre, Temari - Center for Asian and Pacific Arts, Halau Na Kamalei, the Honolulu Symphony, the fundraiser for artist Peggy Chun, and many more. Pieces to be presented as awards have been created for many organizations, including the Hawaii Education Association, Manoa Valley Theatre, Wells Fargo & Co., Goodwill Industries of Hawaii Inc., Hawaii Tourism Authority, Waikiki Community Center, and the Kamehameha Schools.

Boris has received many awards and has participated in a number of public events and juried exhibitions. His work is represented in the HSFCA's Art in Public Places Collection and in private collections as well.

Community News: Okinawan dance residency in Hawai'i

kinawan dance students in Hawai'i were able to learn from Okinawan visiting artist Chinen Sekiyu sensei in a three-week residency from July 10 through August 1. The residency was sponsored by one of our own Okinawan dance schools, Jimpu Kai Kin Ryosho Ryukyu Geino Kenkyusho Hawaii Shibu. Cheryl Yoshie

Nakasone is the school's teacher, who has previously received HSFCA Apprenticeship grants to train the next generation of Okinawan dance teachers in Hawai'i. For this residency, lecture-demonstrations were held at the UH Manoa Music Department, Hawaii Okinawa Center, Jikoen Hongwanji, Aina Haina Library, Maui Okinawa

Kenjin Kai in Wailuku, Maui and in Hilo. In addition, Jimpu Kai students took daily classes with Chinen sensei at the School's studio. Committed to sharing with the community, a small group of her students traveled to Lihue earlier in 2012 to conduct an Okinawan dance outreach under the auspices of our Living Heritage Series program.

Community News: The Hawaiian Room-Dine, Dance, Romance, The Lexington

The Hula Preservation Society and the Mayor's Office of Culture and the Arts celebrate the 75th anniversary of The Hawaiian Room with "The Hawaiian Room: Dine, Dance, Romance, The Lexington." This multi-media exhibit features photographs, newspaper clippings, and oral history video segments culled from the archives of the musicians and hula practitioners who made New York City their home while performing at the Hotel Lexington. Opening in 1937, The Hawaiian Room featured prominent Hawaiian musicians and rapidly grew to include hula practitioners, many of whom also choreographed and produced the show performances.

The exhibit is open from August

27 through September 21, 2012 on the third floor of Honolulu Hale, 530 South King Street, Honolulu. Visit during regular business hours from Monday through Friday, 7:45am to 4:30pm.

On Saturday September 15th during the 6th annual <u>Distinctive</u> Women in Hawaiian History Program at Mission Memorial Auditorium, the Hawaiian Room will be featured along with talk-story and hula from "Hawaiian Room Stars" from 2:25-3:20pm.

The Hula Preservation Society preserves and perpetuates the art of hula by documenting the lives and contributions of kupuna and through its educational projects and programs.
